BOBBO'S STORY

Sandra and I live in teacher housing on Newcomb, NM on the Navajo Reservation. In our three years here we have observed and have tried to help with the stray and abandoned dogs that have come our way. The most rewarding so far has been our experience of fostering Bobbo. While we were still living in the older teacher housing unit, we became aware of two stray dogs wandering around the school and housing areas. One was a female shepherd mix who seemed pretty healthy and a bit larger black, white and brown male dog who turned out to be a mix of shepherd, mastiff and...who knows. It was obvious to everyone that the male was ill, and most people assumed he was dangerous and should be captured and put down, though no one seemed interested in volunteering.

When we moved to newer housing we also inherited the two dogs who seemed to hang around our home more than any place else. We decided to provide feed and water for the male and female daily, and slowly they came to know us and would even let us stay and watch them eat and eventually to pet them. The female would only tolerate that for a short time, but the male seemed to really enjoy it and would even follow me around a little bit. As they became more familiar with us and our dogs, they would sometimes follow us when we went out for a walk.

As winter and snow season came along, we placed a large dog house beside our side door and put first straw and then an old torn-up sleeping bad inside the dog house for warmth. By January we felt that we might be able to work with Blackhat Humane to capture and find placement for them. We started with the female who



allowed me to put a collar on her with a leash. With arrangements to connect in Window Rock, Arizona, we were able to get her into our car and transport her for possible foster placement in Flagstaff. The male dog seemed to be more of a placement problem due to illness.

We agreed to foster the male and immediately moved him into the backyard with the dog house where he settled in quickly and happily. We were very concerned about the constant myoclonic movement and what appeared to be seizures that would last for a minute or two and put the poor guy out of commission for at least an hour. I took him to the vet in Farmington where he was examined, given blood tests, etc. I fully expected to be informed that he was very ill and needed to be put down, which would have been very sad because we were already very connected with Bobbo. We were surprised and happy to discover that apart from the Myoclonic movement and seizures he had to quote the vet "beautiful blood work" and was otherwise very healthy. The vet

diagnosed Bobbo with distemper myoclonus as a puppy with permanent side effects. Eventually, he was placed on medication with the result of a decrease in the quantity and intensity of the seizures as well as a decrease in the intensity of

the myoclonic tics.

Almost from the beginning of our interactions with Bobbo we have found him to be a somewhat clumsy guy with an extremely sweet disposition who loves attention and affection. He gets along well with our three mutts (and they with him, in fact one of our little guys tries to take care of Bobbo when he has a seizure) and responded gently and positively to other humans.

At Blackhat Humane Society, between January and November 2019, We:

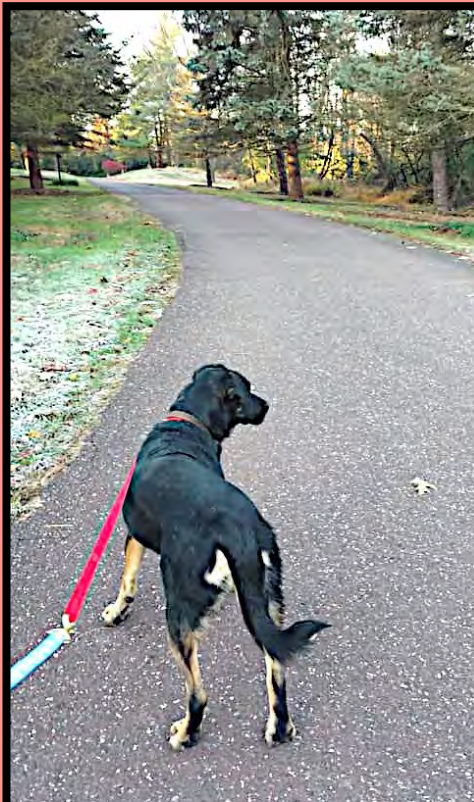
- Placed **140 dogs/cats** in to loving permanent homes;

Bobbo's Angel from Pennsylvania, Patti, found Bobbo on the Pet Hospice site and made contact through Blackhat. Patti has a horse farm about 30 miles from Philadelphia and has provided a home for dogs with special needs, usually two at a time. Having recently lost one of her precious dogs a few months ago she was feeling ready to add to her family again. We discussed Bobbo's special needs, disposition (sweet & lovable and well behaved), shared pictures and backgrounds. This appeared to be a perfect match except for the distance. Patti, Blackhat and I were able to find and hire a company, PETSLLC that specializes in long distance transportation from the South to the Northeast for rescue pets (and only rescue pets). The pickup location was in Wichita Falls, TX, only a 10 hour drive from my home.

Bobbo and I took off for Texas and enjoyed each other's company, stopping for walks and food along the way. Staying overnight in Amarillo provided Bobbo with his first stay in a motel room. Bobbo has never slept on a bed before and has never tried. But about 1:00AM in the morning I felt a bump on the bed and then a warm body snuggle up against me. He slept well the rest of the night. The next day Bobbo was in the caring and capable hands of PETSLLC and on his way to Pennsylvania.

The many pictures and reports we have been receiving from Patti have all been positive. Bobbo has connected already with Patti and his new adopted sibling Daisy, taking walks around the farm and learning that it is okay to sleep on the couch. Many tears of joy have been shed in this household that was enriched by the presence of Bobbo and support from Blackhat.

Puppy Henlock was adopted by a nice young man, who later returned to adopt his sibling Cocobolo as well!

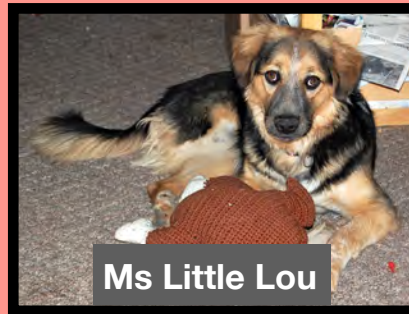
Special BHS Dogs Looking for Homes

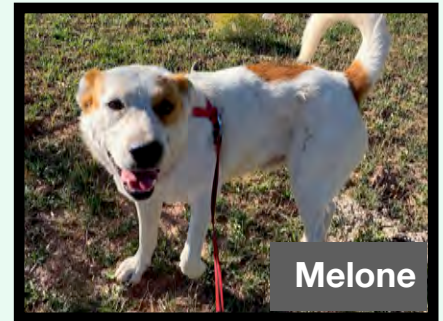
Freya

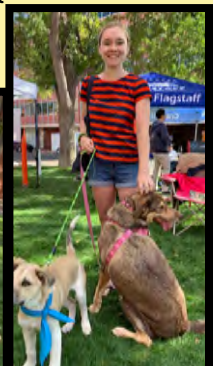
Brewing Some Excitement About Rescue
