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Three Cheers for ALL the Volunteers

Last weekend my wife asked if I would like to travel with her on a Blackhat transfer. A beautiful spring day was before us and we left Chinle a little after 7:30 am to travel north three plus hours through the two corners of the Navajo Reservation in Arizona and Utah, leaving the "rez". passing through Bluff, Blanding and Moab, Utah upon the way.

We met Sarah and Ruby at the Topaz historical site to hand off two Blackhat fosters, Bunny the "ever ready energizer" bunny and Jocelyn the sweet and kind elder heading to her forever home. Sarah and Ruby had traveled south at least as far as we traveled north to transfer Bunny and Jocelyn to their next homes.

The trauma felt by foster dogs is always interesting to me. Being the husband of a volunteer I have seen and helped hundreds of lost dogs in different stages of life and health, both mental and physical. Yet it seems to me, that as important as finding a home for these dogs is — it would be next

to impossible without the help of probably the most important volunteers — the pets of the Blackhat volunteers.

Every Blackhat volunteer is a hero, but at least half of them are the pets (most of them BHS alumni themselves) of the volunteers. In this transfer Ruby was a champion, taking the lead on the walk and letting the fosters know "it's ok, you're with us now".

The volunteers might post dogs on the Blackhat website, vaccinate and take them to the vet, create pet records and feed them, teach them to

"sit", walk on a leash, ride in a car... and more. But in my mind, all of this work to help these dogs would be a catastrophe without the role modeling of the dogs. As a teacher I have learned the students learn as much from the other students as they ever do from me. I value this team work as it builds a strong community.

So I want to say "hip hip hooray" to the unsung heroes of Blackhat: Ruby, Sandy, Loki and Lita, Dezhi, Maureen's pack and every volunteer's dog who helps the strays learn to be pets. My gratitude for the work of all Blackhat volunteers is beyond words, especially for the pets —We love you all!

too energetic. They had followed his story from the beginning and donated to his medical care and really wanted to give him a chance, According to foster Kim, " I thought he would settle down once he got used to a new situation and looks like I was right. Great lesson in not judging a foster or shelter dog in the first 30 minutes after you meet him. I miss him terribly but he's where he needs to be, he gets to live with a former Blackhat alum and is now named Buddy, a new name for the next and best chapter of his life."

In addition to transporting dogs across northern Arizona, our transport volunteer Ezra Gould made sure dogs in remote

regions of Western Navajo got a meal! When Pets Return Home couldn't pick up its donation of dog food from the Purina factory in Flagstaff, Ezra sprang into



action and made not one but two long, dusty trips in his trusty pickup to silver two pallets each to a cluster of sheep camps in Bodaway/Gap and the Western Navajo fairgrounds, whence it will be distributed to needy families by Tuba City Humane Society. "I'm so happy to think of the happy food dance all the dogs will be able to do now," said Ezra.
